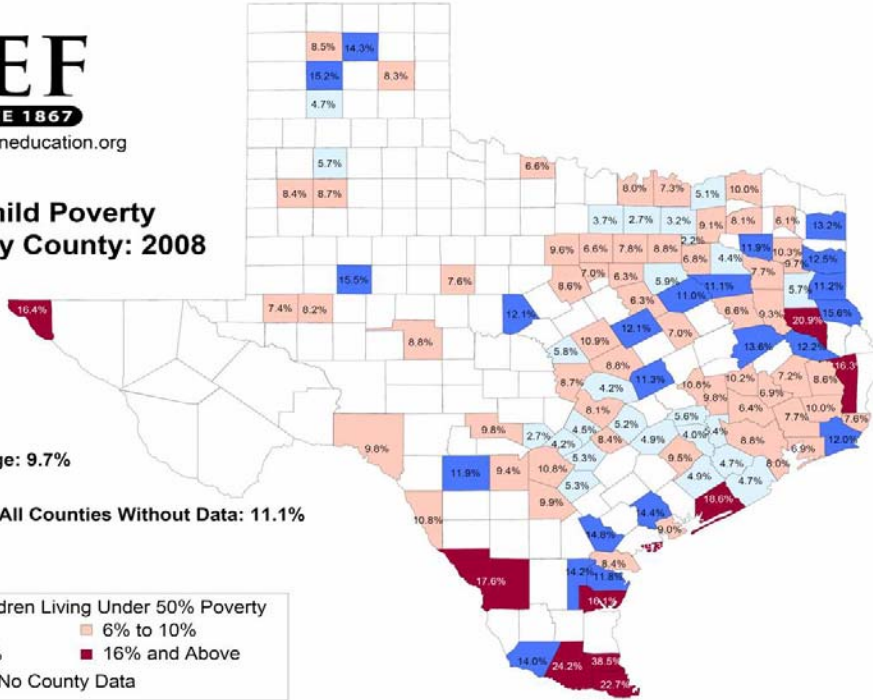
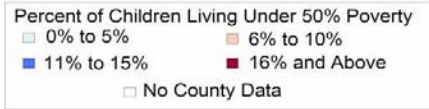


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Extreme Child Poverty in Texas by County: 2008

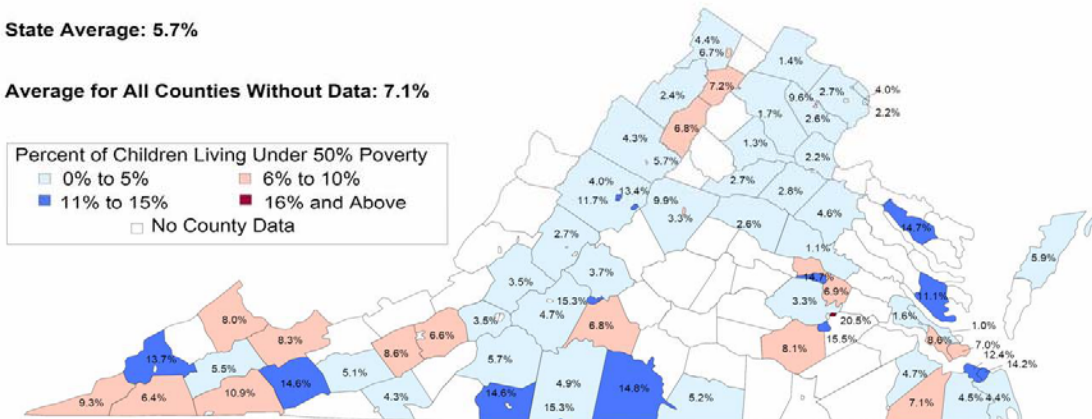

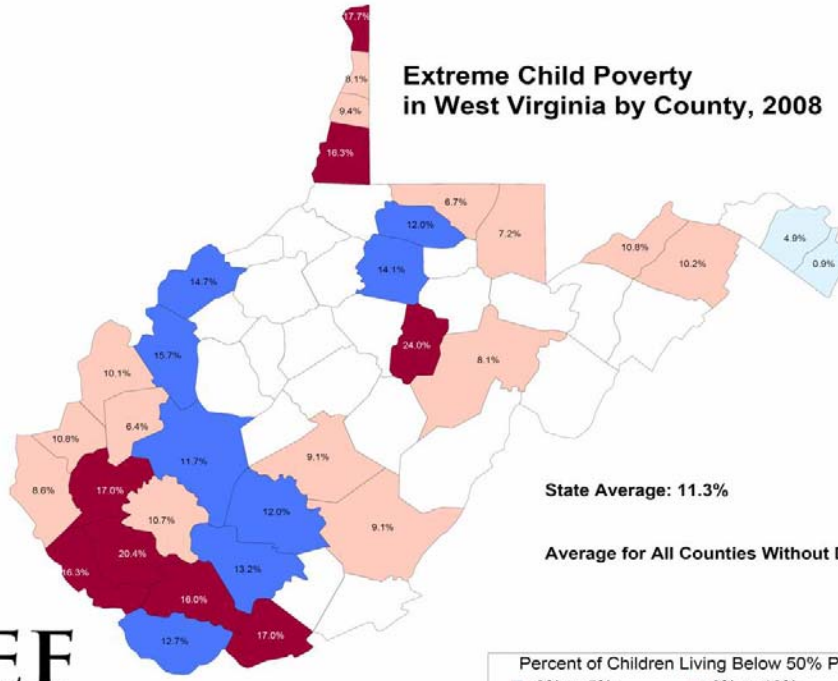
